




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Nadolig 2021 Christmas 2021

Uchafbwyntiau 2021

"Pydew'r Flwyddyn" eleni, heb os nac oni bai, yw'r enghraift yma ffindon ni wrth wneud briff gwyllo yn ardal Camrhos, Sir Benfro (1). Cafodd dyddiad radiocarbon o 6750CC! Mesolithig! Ein darganfyddiad cynharaf erioed! Doedd dim golosg mewn pydew arall gerllaw ond ddaeth crafwr bach Neolithic allan ohono, a welir yma hefyd. Ar begwn arall, daethon ni ar draws pont tramffordd Ynysafan (2) wrth gasglu deunydd ar gyfer panel hanes lleol i grŵp cymunedol yn y Bryn, ger Port Talbot. Cafodd ei adeiladu tua 1841 i gario tramffordd dros yr Afon Afan i waith copr Cwmafan. Rydym hefyd wedi chwarae rhan mewn prosiectau rheoli effeithiau newid hinsawdd ar dwyni tywod Cynfig, Bro Morgannwg (3) ac hefyd yng nghorsydd mawn Claerwen, uwchlaw Dyffryn Elan, Powys.

Treulion ni rhai diwrnodau diddorol yn cloddio safle lloc Lluest Abercaethon. Cwm Elan (4), ble fuodd Ian Brooks gyda ni yn 2020 i wneud arolwg geoffisegol (ar gyfer prosiect i Ymddiriedolaeth Cwm Elan, sy wedi ei ariannu gan y HLF). Dim ond darnau o grochenwaith y 19eg ganrif ddaeth allan o'n ffos, felly mae llawer o grafu pen o hyd ynglŷn â dyddiad a phwrrpas y lloc. Lle unig, ond gawsom gwmni Vic Pardoe, a ddaeth Ian am ddiwrnod gyda'i ddrôn, fel y gwnaeth David James, Rhayader Gwy. Daeth Ian Brooks am ymweliad arall ac roedd ef yn cymryd diddordeb yn y microlith bach Mesolithig ffindon ni yn y pridd - prawf bod helwyr Mesolithig wedi bod yn yr ardal.

Diddorol oedd dod ar draws carnedd gylchog annisgwyl (5) o fewn mynwent o garneddau cofrestredig ar Rhos Llangeler, Sir Gâr, diolch i dystiolaeth hen luniau o'r awyr. Gwelir darn o Linell Amddiffyn Sir Gaerfyrddin ar y chwith yn y llun, gafodd ei godi ar ddechrau'r Ail Ryfel Byd. Mae Oes y Cofid wedi cynyddu'r galw am atgyweirio a throsi hen adeiladau fferm a bythynnod er mwyn creu cartrefi newydd. Felly, rydym wedi ymweld â llawer o adeiladau diddorol eleni a fydd, gobeithio, yn cael bywyd newydd fel canlyniad (6 & 7).

Highlights of 2021

The "Pit of the Year" was definitely one we found during a watching brief at Camrose, Pembrokeshire (1), which produced a radiocarbon date of 6750BC! Mesolithic! Our earliest find. Another pit at the site had no charcoal but contained a nice Neolithic scraper, also shown. At the other end of the scale, we did a panel for a community group at Bryn, Port Talbot, which included the lovely Ynysafan tramway bridge (2), built c. 1841 to take coal to the Cwmafan Copper Works. We have also been engaged in climate change management projects at Kenfig Dunes in the Vale of Glamorgan (3) as well as in the peat bogs of Claerwen, above the Elan Valley.

A useful few days were spent at Lluest Abercaethon in the Elan Valley (4) digging a 10 metre trench on the enclosure there where we had Ian Brooks do a geophysical survey in 2020 (for this HLF funded Elan Trust project). The trench produced only 19th century crockery, so we are still pondering on that one. Vic Pardoe brought his drone for a day, as did David James of Rhayader and Ian Brooks visited again and took away a single Mesolithic microlith we found in the topsoil - proof that Mesolithic hunters had been in the valley.

We found an unexpected ring barrow (5) within a recognised barrow cemetery on Rhos Llangeler, Carmarthenshire, showing the value of aerial photographs. The WW2 Carmarthenshire Stop Line is to the left in the photo. Probably as a response to the Covid Age we've also seen a real demand for building recording projects where plans have been made to replace or convert old barns and cottages. As a result we have been introduced to some lovely buildings which will hopefully be given new leases of life (6 & 7).
